

Getting Out of the Boat: New and Exciting Ideas

During my sermon on Sunday, August 9, I challenged the congregation. The challenge had to do with Peter getting out of the boat to try to walk on water toward Jesus. I encouraged church members to get out of our metaphorical boats, out of our comfort zones. This would come in the form of new and exciting ideas for mission and outreach, for education and for keeping connected - for any way we can continue to be the church during this time of pandemic. Already, some new ideas have emerged from this challenge:

- 1) **VBS In A Bag** Since Vacation Bible School had to be cancelled, we are going to deliver VBS in a bag to our children. It will include lessons, activities, and possibly even a snack. We might even go so far as to do a Zoom meeting to sing VBS songs together.
- 2) **Butterfly Flocks** Symbolizing new life, we are going to plant a flock of plastic butterflies in the yard of a church member. It will include an encouragement to "flock" to our Facebook Live broadcast on Sunday mornings. This church member will then, within two or three days, plant the flock in another church member's yard. The flock will hopefully travel from yard to yard in this way until we finally get back together for in-person worship, when the flock will be brought to the front of our church. A fun and goofy idea with a neat bit of symbolism.
- 3) **Duck Hunt** An activity for the youth group. Rubber ducks will be hidden around Covington, and the youth will be given hints as to their location. They will search for the ducks in another fun and goofy activity.

FRIED GREEN TOMATOES

(Serves 6)

5 green tomatoes, sliced $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick

 $1^{1}/_{2}$ teaspoons salt

 $1^{1/2}$ cups all-purpose flour, divided

1 cup buttermilk

1 large egg

1 cup plain yellow cornmeal

1 tablespoon seasoned salt

Vegetable oil, for frying

Place tomato slices on paper towels and sprinkle with $^{3}/_{4}$ teaspoon salt. Turn tomatoes, and sprinkle with remaining $^{3}/_{4}$ teaspoon salt. Let stand for at least 30 minutes or up to 2 hours to remove excess water. Pat dry with paper towels.

Place ¹/₂ cup flour in a shallow dish. Wisk together buttermilk and egg in a separate shallow dish. In another shallow dish, combine cornmeal, seasoned salt, and remaining 1 cup flour.

Dredge tomatoes in flour. Shake off excess. Dip in buttermilk mixture to coat. Dredge tomatoes in cornmeal mixture. Shake off excess.

In a large skillet pour vegetable oil to a depth of $^{1}/_{8}$ inch and heat over medium heat. Add tomatoes in batches. Cook for 3 to 4 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Drain well on a wire rack. Serve immediately.

Jim and others recognized so quickly that this would be the ideal way to stay in touch with many members during this time of uncertainty.

While I am not "on Facebook," I am able to watch the video of each Sunday's service later in the week. It is always a treat to see who was watching and see all of the warm greetings as the service begins. Your kind sentiments to one another and your positive comments about the sermon and the music mean so much during this unusual time when there are only three of us in the sanctuary and we can't see the expressions on your beautiful faces. The gathering of the McAllister church family, whether all together in the church building or online, reminds me of one of my very favorite old American folk hymns, "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship." First published in 1829, it can be found on page 585 of our hymnal. There are many beautiful renditions of this lovely tune, both vocal and instrumental, to be found online. Just type in the title, or the hymn tune name, HOLY MANNA. The most traditional text for this tune reads as follows:

"Brethren, we have met to worship and adore the Lord our God; Will you pray with all your power, while we try to preach the Word? All is vain unless the Spirit of the Holy One comes down; Brethren, pray, and holy manna will be showered all around.

Let us love our God supremely. Let us love each other too. Let us love and pray for sinners till our God makes all things new. Then He'll call us home to heaven. At His table we'll sit down. Christ will gird Himself and serve us with sweet manna all around."

So whether we are together in body or just in spirit, we are still the church family of McAllister Memorial Presbyterian, always striving to "love God supremely and each other, too." Take good care.
