of Covington's downtown.






McAllister is home to the area's COPE Food Pantry, and this is only one of our important ministries.




More than numbers

Livestreaming Manual

The Livestreaming Manual is at the printer's. Four copies are being assembled: one for the livestreaming desk in the balcony, one for the office, and two available to those interested in learning how it all works and in assisting with the church's live Sunday broadcast.

The manual documents the equipment setup and how the equipment is connected. It walks one through the set-up of Open Broadcaster Software (OBS), creation and publishing of slides with Google slides, and the process of actually going live on Facebook LIVE. How sound is integrated into the livestream is also addressed.

The livestreaming manual is specific to the set-up at McAllister and anyone willing to put in the time can learn how to produce one of the church's Sunday Worship Service livestreams. Inquire at the church office.
