According to John Chilton at the Episcopal Café, reflecting on how people position themselves in relation to others during the sermon, and indeed throughout the entire worship service, provides important clues to how a congregation understands itself as a faith community. People's interactions reveal how they order their world.

Hierarchy of prestige to seats?

Wow! Glad those days are gone!

The online article by Chuck Lawless gives six reasons why you should sit in a different seat at church on Sunday. Here are three:

You'll get to know different people. You might already know everybody in the church, but sitting with different people will give you the opportunity to get to know somebody more deeply. If you don't know everybody, moving your seat will allow you to know somebody new.

You'll see the hear the service differently. It's strange, actually, how

changing your seat alters your perspective on the service. You look at the pastor from a different vantage point. You hear the music and the singing differently.

You'll learn to be more comfortable with change in general. Change your place each week, and you'll likely be more open to change as we move forward as a church in the future.
