A Word From Your Pastor A Pentecost Wind

The timing was perfect. It was Pentecost of last year, and the folks at WestRock could not have picked a better time to blow off steam. If you've ever been near the mill when they blow off steam, you know how loud it can be. It can almost sound like there is a hurricane wind blowing outside. Which is why it was so appropriate that they chose this particular Sunday morning in May to do it.

Pentecost is a special day on the church calendar when we remember the fantastic story from the second chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. In this story, the disciples of Jesus Christ were gathered together in Jerusalem. All of a sudden, they were overcome by the sound of a rushing wind, and tongues of fire rested over each of their heads. Even though they were from different places and spoke different languages, they could understand each other. The Holy Spirit had descended and was at work among them!

This is why it was so appropriate for the mill to blow off steam on Pentecost morning. As I stood in the empty sanctuary (at the time, we had suspended inperson worship because of Covid), I read the story of Pentecost to my phone camera to broadcast on Facebook Live. The sound of a rushing wind was literally coming through the walls as I read the story. So although the congregation could not be gathered there, it still felt like the Holy Spirit was present, because of that loud sound. It was loud enough to be heard on people's devices as they watched the broadcast.

This year, the timing is perfect again. Not for the mill to blow off steam, but for the Holy Spirit to descend. First, it will descend because we once again have people in the sanctuary for worship. But it will also come down because we are at a critical moment in the life of our church.

As we come out of this Covid crisis, we have the opportunity to let the Spirit lead us. We have the chance to do some new things in our worship and in our

mission. I don't think we are being called to simply go back to the way things were. Yes, we will try to recapture some of what was lost during the Covid time. But at the same time, we will also look toward a "new normal" that goes beyond just returning to our old practices. One way we are doing this is through our livestreaming of the worship service. Another is how we are combining Sunday school classes when we start back on June 6.

What other ways are we being called to do something new and exciting in the post-Covid era? How are we letting that rushing wind blow through our church life and re-invigorate and re-inspire us? May we not just hear this wind blow. But like a sailboat, may we catch this wind and let it carry us to exciting new places!

Dead Ducks Don't Flutter

Many years ago, a wealthy man went duck hunting with a hired hand named Sam. They took a horse and carriage, and along the way a rim came off one of the wheels. As Sam hammered it back on, he accidentally hit his finger. Instantly he let go with some bad words. He quickly fell to his knees, asking God's forgiveness. "Lord, it's difficult at times to live the Christian life", he prayed. "Sam" said the man, "I know you're a Christian, but tell me why you struggle so, I'm an atheist, and I don't have problems like that."

Sam didn't know what to say. Just then two ducks flew overhead. The man raised his gun and two shots rang out. "Leave the dead one and go after that wounded bird!" he shouted. Sam pointed at the duck that was fluttering desperately to escape and said, "I've got an answer for you now, Boss. You said my Christianity isn't any good because I have to struggle so. Well, I'm the wounded duck and struggle to get away from the devil. But you, Boss, you're the dead duck!"

That insight fits Paul's description of his Christian experience in Romans 7:14-25.

Struggle is one evidence of God's work in our lives. Forgiveness of sin is available, so don't despair. Remember, dead ducks don't flutter.
