

A Word From Your Pastor

~ Taking Jesus With You ~

A few mornings ago, I had pulled out of my driveway and was heading down White Oak Drive toward the church. That's when I got the sinking feeling that I was forgetting something. It was that feeling that I was missing something, that I had neglected to do something habitual as I prepared for the day.

So I ran over a mental checklist in my head. Brushed my teeth. Check. Taken my medicine. Check. Made sure that the dogs had been fed. Check. Grabbed my wallet and phone on the way out the door. Check.

No, wait a minute. I felt down at my left front pocket, where I usually keep my phone. It wasn't there. After a moment of panic, I realized that I had to turn around and go back home. I couldn't go anywhere without my phone. So I pulled into a driveway, backed my truck back into the street, and headed back to the house to get my phone.

What if we felt the same way about Jesus? What if it didn't feel right going anywhere without taking Jesus with us? What if he was part of our morning routine just as surely as brushing our teeth and feeding the dogs?

How do we make Jesus a part of our morning routine? How do we take Jesus with us? One way is through prayer. In addition to all those other things we have to do, we can add a few minutes to be with the Lord. As I'm going through my busy morning, I take a few moments to lie still on the couch and meditate. I ask Jesus to be with me as I go through my day.

I started doing this a few years ago and have found that it really centers me and sets me in the right frame of mind. I can handle whatever the day throws at me because I know that the Lord is with me.

So don't forget to brush your teeth. Or to feed the dogs. Or to take your phone with you. Or to take Jesus with you. Make time to be with him part of every morning. And if you forget, take time out from any part of your day. It's never a bad time to slow down, to breathe for a few minutes, and to lift a prayer to the Lord.


No time, no time, too much to do, that was my constant cry, No time to give to souls in need but at last the time, the time to die.

Musical Minute

Two of our dedicated choir members, Pearl Miller and Joe Martin, collaborated on that golden oldie, "Take the Name of Jesus with You" at McAllister on Sunday the 20th of August. Reflecting on the morning's service later that afternoon, I marveled at the longevity of some of our favorite hymns in the Christian church. Just how many people have sung those very words or hummed its tune in the 150 or so years since the text was penned by Lydia Baxter? And why does it still have meaning for the church in 2023? According to hymnary.com, Baxter wrote numerous hymn texts, but "Take the Name" is the only one still found in contemporary hymnals – 625 hymnals of various denominations, to be exact. The tune is catchy and the refrain, no doubt, is fun to sing, but it's clear that both the tune and text are of another era. Yet still, both resonate.

As an organist, I confess that my preferred hymns are the *real* oldies. "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" was written and composed by reformer Martin Luther sometime between 1527 and 1529, but the sound of a congregation, no matter the size, singing those confident words of faith paired with that powerful tune is soul stirring. "Let goods and kindred go, this mortal life also; the body they may kill: God's truth abideth still; His kingdom is forever!" Strong words, to be sure. The tune to the Doxology (OLD HUNDREDTH) which we sing each and every Sunday is commonly attributed to Louis Bourgeois who was born in Paris in 1510, and parts of the melody may date back even further. Its effect on us is all the more meaningful because we know that for centuries before us believers have worshiped using the same tune.

McAllister Memorial has, in my lifetime at least, not only tolerated, but embraced a wealth of musical genres and eras. In the years before I went off to college I was exposed to a vast variety of sacred music from classical to gospel, to timeless spirituals and contemporary pieces. A typical Sunday in our sanctuary these days might include a prelude from 2017, a Choral Call to Worship from the 1970s, a hymn or two from the 1700 and 1800s and maybe one from 1983, a solo or anthem from the 1990s, and a baroque postlude from the late 1600s. It can all be meaningful and beautiful. Even our beloved


McAllister Church participated in this year's Relay For Life event held on **Saturday**, **August 5** at the Jackson River Sports Complex.

No matter where your tastes fall in the musical spectrum (and I hope that you can find a little something to enjoy in all of the music that you hear at McAllister), the music of the church speaks to all of us in unique ways, grounding us in our faith, and establishing our lineage in the history of Christianity. Our beloved, classic hymn urges us, "Come, Christians, Join to Sing." Let's go make some noise!
