

#### A Word From Your Pastor ~ "My Favorite Hymns"

Reformation Sunday is coming up on October 27. This is a day when we celebrate our heritage as churches of the Reformation, of the time when leaders like Martin Luther and John Calvin broke away from the Roman Catholic Church and formed new denominations.

As part of our Reformation Day celebration, we will be having a hymn sing. Here are three of my favorite hymns which I hope we get to sing:

- 1) No. 262 Holy, Holy, Holy. This was a childhood favorite of mine. I have always loved the powerful chord structure and melody. The words are pretty impressive, too, as it outlines the three persons of the Trinity. I especially love the words of the fourth verse: "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty! All Thy works shall praise Thy name in earth and sky and sea." It is always exciting to hear a congregation soar to the high notes as it belts out this line.
- 2) No. 374 O Love That Will Not Let Me Go. This is a slower, more subdued hymn. The beauty of it is subtle, as it outlines the many ways that we receive God's love. I especially like the third verse: "O Joy that seekest me thru pain, I cannot close my heart to Thee; I trace the rainbow thru the rain, and feel the promise is not vain that morn shall tearless be." The striking image of the rainbow emerging from the rainstorm brings me comfort and joy every time I sing it.
- 3) No. 1 Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee. One can see why the makers of our hymnbook decided to put this hymn first. Set to the tune of Beethoven's famous "Ode to Joy," this powerful hymn soars with lyrics about the glory of grandeur of our Lord. I especially like the way the final verse closes: "Ever singing, march we onward, victors in the midst of strife. Joyful music leads us sunward in the triumph song of life." When sung to begin a worship service, one cannot help but be roused by these inspiring words.

Those are three of my favorite hymns. What are some of your favorites? What makes the music so powerful and the words so inspiring? Please let me know what some of your favorites are, and hopefully we can include them in our hymn sing on Reformation Sunday.







We miss being there in person, but we worship with you watching the service on Facebook. Thanks to Andy for all of his time in bringing this service to us.




















Here's a question for you. What's white, green, and sometimes red, maybe 4 inches tall, occasionally fierce-tempered, with an insatiable appetite for something sweet, and oh—it weighs about as much as a marshmallow (0.1 to 0.2 ounces in adulthood to be exact)? If you guessed Archilochus colubris, or the ruby-throated hummingbird, you'd be correct! These fiery little birds are one of God and Mother Nature's finest collaborations.

We've spent much of the summer admiring the tiny ruby-throated hummingbirds outside our windows and on our front porch. While we always see hummingbirds in the summer, this year we've had them all day, everyday, thanks to the ornamental salvia in hues of red, fuschia, and blue, and various basil varieties I potted up for our back deck. There's a sugar water feeder, too, for good measure. For all of their beauty, agility, and diminutive size, they are unlikely warriors, scaring the daylights out of us when we're on the deck with a morning cup of tea or coffee-screaming around our heads and squealing like a miniature out-of-control motorcycle careening around a tight corner, all this commotion in pursuit of a second intruding hummer bold enough to attempt a sip of nectar from a favorite bloom. What attitude! We marvel at the speed of their aerial acrobatics, their ability to fly backward and to hover, and simply the thought that something so miniscule can survive and seemingly thrive with so many larger birds and other predators around. I read on one website that a hummer's brain makes up 4% of its body weight and that it remembers every single flower and feeder it visits. If this is true, it would explain the accusing glare we get when we hang a fern where a begonia hung the year before!

I had an acquaintance in Lewisburg, WVA, who had the opportunity to witness the miraculousness of these feisty avian friends from an even closer vantage point when he spotted a nest outside one of his dormer windows while checking his gutters. In order to avoid disturbing the nestlings, he'd take a mirror and hold it outside the open window so he could observe their development. He was delighted one day when he was treated to the sight of their first clumsy attempts at fledging. He said they looked like feathered nickels as they rose, hovered, and settled back into the nest.

And speaking of their nests—wow! I was inspired this summer to do a little reading about our neighbors just outside the window. Their nests are made of soft plant matter ("thistle and dandelion down" was one poetic description) and spider silk. (I suspect they also contain some fairy dust and perhaps a hair or two from the mane


#### PASTOR APPRECIATION

of a unicorn . . . ) Most hummer nests are only a smidge over an inch in diameter. It's the mother's job to build the nest and incubate the eggs. She forms the rim of the nest by pressing it between her neck and chest and then stomps down the material to form the bowl. The spider silk enables the nest to expand as the baby birds grow. Astonishing!

I know the remaining days with our iridescent friends are limited. The exquisite ruby-throats, North America's only hummer to breed in the east, will soon embark on their epic migration to warmer climes for the winter. They'll head out individually, not in large protective flocks. (Apparently they're not much for fellowship and gathering. Maybe that's why we Presbyterians see so few of them at potlucks . . . ) These amazing, ferocious beauties will head to Mexico and Central America in search of sweet plant nectar and small insects. For many, their journey will cover 500 miles across the Gulf of Mexico, not even counting the miles they covered to get to the southern coast of the United States. (And they aren't even four inches from head to heel!) In the meantime, I'm taking every opportunity to enjoy them "up close." I'm looking forward to winter and I'd love to have some snow this year, but I'll be happy to see our feisty friends return next spring!



# THE WALL THAT HEALS

VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL
REPLICA & MOBILE EDUCATION CENTER







Welcome to *The Wall That Heals*, the three-quarter scale traveling replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. The exhibit consists of the Wall replica and the mobile Education Center. *The Wall That Heals* exhibit is open to the public day and night throughout the visit.

#### THE WALL REPLICA

The three-quarter scale Wall replica is 375 feet in length and stands 7.5 feet high at its tallest point. Visitors experience The Wall rising above them as they walk towards the apex, a key feature of the design of The Wall in D.C.

Like the original Memorial, The Wall That Heals is erected in a chevron-shape and visitors can do name rubbings of individual service member's names on The Wall.

The Wall replica is constructed of Avonite, a synthetic granite, and its 140 numbered panels are supported by an aluminum frame. Machine engraving of the more than 58,000 names along with modern LED lighting provide readability of The Wall day and night.

#### MOBILE EDUCATION CENTER

The 51-foot trailer that carries *The Wall That Heals* transforms to become a mobile Education Center. The exterior of the trailer features a timeline of "The War and The Wall" and provides additional information about the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. Additional exhibits give visitors a better understanding of the legacy of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and the collection of items left at The Wall. Displays include:

- > Hometown Heroes Photos of service members on The Wall who list their home of record from the local area. The photos are part of VVMF's Wall of Faces an effort to ensure the faces and stories of those on The Wall will never be forgotten. Help is needed to find better photos. - > Map of Vietnam

- > In Memory Honor Roll Photos of Vietnam veterans (from the state we're on display) honored through VVMF's In Memory program which honors veterans who served in Vietnam, returned home and later died. A replica In Memory plaque is part of The Wall That Heals exhibit. Learn more at: www.vvmf.org/inmemory
- A display of items representative of those left at The Wall in Washington, D.C.
- Names on The Wall Directories two directories allow for specific names on The Wall to be found alphabetically. A book is also available on site that features all 5,000+ *In Memory* honorees.
- The Gold Star Bike Donated to VVMF by the American Gold Star Mothers in 2012, the Softail Custom Harley motorcycle pays tribute to the mothers who lost sons to the Vietnam War.

## HOW TO FIND A NAME ON THE WALL



Names are arranged in order of date of casualty and alphabetically on each day, beginning at the center with panel 1E (under 1959), down panel 1E, then moving right towards 70E, then 70W towards the center, and ending above the 1975 on 1W. The first and last casualties are side by side at the apex of the Memorial.

- 1. Find a service member's name and location on The Wall in paper directories or online at VVMF's Wall of Faces at www.vvmf.org/thewall or by downloading VVMF's The Wall app at www.vvmf.org/app
- 2. Panel numbers are on the bottom of every panel. Row numbers count down from the top of each panel. On the margin of every other panel are white dots every 10 lines. Count down 4 dots and you're on line 40.

Each name is preceded (on the West Wall) or followed (on the East Wall) by a symbol designating status.

- Symbol denotes that the service member is known dead or presumed dead.
- Symbol denotes that the service member was missing or prisoner status when The Wall was built in 1982 and remains unaccounted for today. When a service member is repatriated, the diamond is superimposed over the cross.
